FILM/VIDEO



Producer

Producers plan and coordinate various aspects of film production,. They select the script; coordinate writing, direct, and edit/arrange the film.

Scriptwriter

A screenwriter writes content for visual mediums such as film. They write screenplays for feature films, short films, television, commercials, and video games. They create the dialogue, the characters and the storyline of a script.

Film Director


Film directors control the film's artistic and dramatic aspects and visualizes the screenplay (or script) while guiding the technical crew and actors in the fulfilment of that vision. The director also has a key role in choosing the cast members, production design and all the creative aspects of filmmaking.

Runner



Camera Operator

Television camera operators work with digital electronic film cameras and produce required shots by combining the use of complex technology with creative visual skills.

They work under a director or director of photography and may be supported by a camera assistant.


They may work on a variety of programmes, for example studio or outside broadcast programmes, television dramas, commercials, documentaries or news. You may use one of several cameras or a portable single camera (PSB).

Sound Set Design

Sound Designers are responsible for obtaining all sound effects, whether recorded or live for a specific production. They are also responsible for setting up the sound playback equipment and must make sure the board operator is properly trained. Sound Design is an artistic component of the production.

Casting Manager

A casting director finds the stars to bring the characters in a film or TV production to life. They are hired by the production company to match actors to roles. Casting directors read scripts and meet with producers and directors to get a sense of the type of person they are looking for.

Locations Manager



Costume Designer


A Costume designer creates the outfits worn in movies, television shows, or theater productions. You need to be creative, meticulous, and able to work under stress and deadlines to consider a career as a costume designer. A degree in fashion design is usually preferred by employers. Costume designers combine elements of color and fabric textures to provide a visual understanding of characters in terms of age, social status, occupation and era. Their work is a critical element in television shows, theater productions and movies.

Photographer - Creative/ Commerical





Product photography is a form of commercial photography and has the goal of presenting a product in the best possible representation.


The product photographer is responsible for capturing images of products for advertising purposes. Product photographers work with brands to create images that will best represent the product.

Artist/Event Photography


Independent photography is a form of photography that has the aim of presenting a non-mainstream product in the best possible photographic representation. Often, these are 'social' photographs, or deal with subject matter that is classed as 'leftfield' or 'underground'. Event Photographers capture special moments at weddings, anniversaries, parties, and shows. Their common duties listed on an Event Photographer resume sample are discussing requirements with clients, taking photographs during festivities, composing shots, editing photos after the event, and delivering the final product.

Portrait/Wedding Photography


A portrait photographers take pictures of people, either individually or in groups. They sometimes specialize in specific types of portraiture, like weddings, events, or senior portraits for high school students. Commonly, portrait photographers also edit and print the photos they take for clients.

Forensic Photography



DESIGN



Graphic Design

A graphic designer works to bring all kinds of communication alive. Graphic designers produce designs that get their clients' messages across with high visual impact. They work on a huge variety of products, including websites, product packaging, books and magazines, corporate identity (to give organisations a visual 'brand'), advertising, exhibitions and displays, and computer games.

Most graphic design work is now done on computer using specialised industry-standard graphics and multimedia software packages and hardware. Graphic designers have to work closely with other colleagues involved in projects, such as copywriters, photographers and sales staff. They may also work directly with clients.

Web Designer

Web designers create the look, layout, and features of a website. The job involves understanding both graphic design and computer programming. Once a website is created, a designer helps with maintenance and additions to the website. They usually work with development teams or managers for keeping the site up-to-date and prioritizing needs, among other tasks. Web designers also plan, create and code internet sites and web pages, many of which combine text with sounds, pictures, graphics and video clips. A web designer is responsible for creating the design and layout of a website or web pages.

Interior Designer

The interior designers are tasked with designing, implementing and refurbishing interior spaces. These DIY dynamos transform rooms in accordance with their clients requested requirements, using their artistic flair and understanding of colour to design interior spaces that have the right aesthetic appeal and make the most of the available space.

Product Designer

Product designers design most things we use in our day-to-day lives, from tables and utensils to clocks and PCs, as well as specialist products like medical, electronics or telecommunications equipment.

Their aim is to improve the way that existing products work and look and/or produce them at a lower cost. They may also be involved in designing entirely new products.

Fashion Designer

A Fashion Designer designs and assists with the production of clothing, shoes and accessories, identifies trends, and selects styles, fabrics, colors, prints and trims for a collection. Fashion Designers commonly design ready-to-wear clothing for retail markets or special events. Depending on level of responsibility and the company, a fashion designer may work to their own brief or be given a brief to work towards (including specifications in relation to colour and fabric) and develop a product from this.

Architect

An architect creates designs for new construction projects, alterations and redevelopments. They commonly use their specialist construction knowledge and high-level drawing skills to design buildings that are functional, safe, sustainable and aesthetically pleasing.

VFX



VFX Designer

VFX artists use software to create animations and special effects. Typically they work on movies, television shows, or video games.

Using software, VFX artists create visually engaging motion graphics and animations. This sometimes involves working with a few dimensional models. The animations and graphics they create are stylistically consistent and enhance the visual style of their work.

Animator

Animators create figures with personality by making them move in ways that show their character and emotion. In VFX, they normally use computer-generated 'rigs' to help make the characters in a shot move in a believable way. They might animate vehicles or machinery too.

Data Capture Technician

Data capture technical directors go onto the film or TV set to collect the information about the live-action footage that the teams in the VFX studio need to add the visual effects.

They take photographs of the set and the way the cameras are positioned. They tend to capture data about the type of lens type being used, its focal length, filters, focus and colour temperature. They also record the camera height, camera mount and distance between the camera and actor, and other details.

Modelling Artist

Modelling artists create characters, artillery, plants and animals on a computer in 3D.


They start with a brief, which could be 2D or 3D art produced by a concept artist. Or they can work from reference materials, such as photographs or line drawing sketches, which can be scanned into 3D software.

Production Manager


A production manager will act on the decisions that have been made by the VFX producer. They create a detailed schedule for the project and look after the budget.

VFX Editor

VFX editors work as a link between the film or TV production team, which shoots the live-action footage, and the VFX studio that does the visual effects. VFX editors can be employed by a VFX studio or directly by the film or TV production company. The role varies depending on whether they are in-house (employed by the studio) or client-side (employed by the film or TV production company).

Compositor


Compositors create the final image of a frame, shot or VFX sequence. They take many different digital materials used (assets), such as computer-generated (CG) images, live action footage and matte paintings, and combine them to appear as one cohesive image and shot.

Media Teacher/Tutor



Media Studio Owner/Manager



Media Blogger/Vlogger



Media Retail roles: sales, management


Retail managers manage the daily operations of a store or department and will have employees reporting to you. You'll report to an area manager.
